There are 3 tests for English – a reading, a grammar and punctuation test as well as a spelling test. Let's look at the **reading test**, in which children answer questions about a set of short texts, fiction and non-fiction. Your child will have 1 hour to read these texts and answer the questions.

They are allowed to make notes on the reading booklet, which will not be marked. So, encourage them to underline:

- **key events in the story**
- **words which tell what a character is like**
- **key facts**
- **anything which suggests time of day (like 'low sun' would be morning or evening)**
- **phrases they like – handy if there is a question asking for an opinion on the story**

These could help your child find their way around the text when answering questions. They must read each question twice. It doesn't take long, and will aid understanding what is needed each time.

Questions in this part of the test often ask 'Which part of the story tells us that.....' - so your child will need to quote, or summarise that part of the story to answer the question properly. Remind them to try all questions, which do not necessarily get harder through the test.

Here are some tips for how to use practise papers with your child:

- Look through a practise paper together and talk about how you'd answer the questions. If you are undertaking activities, choose sections of the paper rather than trying to complete the whole thing in one go.
- Agree on what the question is actually asking you to do.
- The number of marks each question is worth is printed at the side.
- One mark answers can be brief – one word or number.
- Two mark answers will require at least two bits of information, like two different phrases, or an answer complete with method.
- Three mark answers need to be thorough. Encourage your child to look for this information, and not to waste time agonising over the one-mark answers.
- Some questions are multi-choice. If they don't know the answer, your child can guess – and might still get a mark. Children aren't used to doing this!
- If they get stuck on a question, tell them to move on rather than waste time on it.
- Practice spending five minutes checking a paper to make sure all the questions are answered as fully as necessary.
